# Education Inclusion Service



The Education Inclusion Service was established in 2015 and brings together the key areas of **SEND, Attendance & Exclusions and Participation** post 16.

### What have we been doing?

- Vital work with school leaders and governors to address rising pupil exclusions in Norfolk.
- Reviewing capacity within our specialist provision.
- Developing an approach, with education providers and parents/carers, for appropriate support and challenge to help improve outcomes

### **Celebrating success:**

- NEET and participation figures are now in line with or better than the national average
- School absence rates are improving, and Special schools are well above the national average for pupil attendance
- Schools value Access Through Technology support
- Accredited training offered by the Portage service and by the Visually Impaired/Multi-Sensory Impaired Team

## **Progress with post 16**

1,128 more young people in education, employment or training

The last year has seen a significant increase in the two areas of greatest challenge: increasing participation at 17 and reducing the number of young people who cannot be contacted (unknowns). The pace of improvement for participation at

17 has increased at such a rate that it

is now in line with the national average. In addition, the participation of 16 year olds is now well above the national average. The number of unknowns has also reduced from 16.1% in May 2015 to 6.8% in December 2015 (national average is 10.6%).

The average percentage of 16-18 year olds classed as NEET (not in education, employment or training) for November 2015-January 2016 was 4.2% which is the lowest ever recorded in Norfolk and is now in line with national. In May 2015 this figure was 6.6%.

Our Education Inclusion Service has also played an important role in providing specialist career guidance and tracking services. Guidance Advisers make contact with the young people when they know their results, either by phone or on their doorstep, to work through what they could do next and find the most suitable option.

Beth, 17, from North Norfolk who has benefitted from a study programme at YMCA says; *"Personally I have* something now to get up for in the morning; I now have a purpose. It is rewarding to know that I am going to something that will help me in my future. I had no idea what YMCA was or what they did and without the help of my Guidance Adviser who got to know me and what support I needed I wouldn't have even known about it."

# Helping children with special educational needs

The Norfolk Portage Service is part of the support system for children with additional and special educational needs. It includes a free home visiting service for pre-school children who may have

developmental or learning difficulties, a physical disability or other special need. The service continues to work directly with families who value the contribution that the Service makes to the lives of their children.

- The **Enhanced Offer** enables us to broker and commission links for your school with local and national programmes and projects.


All **NB2B** schools will be provided with free access to The School Bus and the SchoolBusPlus.

# The Education Partnership Service works

closely with Norfolk schools, the DfE and existing multi academy trusts. This year we have spoken to over 200 schools and as a result many more Norfolk schools are in a strong collaboration or working towards joining one. Our Small Schools Review has been a priority for us and almost all of our smallest schools have a more sustainable future, often in federations or trusts. This year has seen us continue to work with international partners, for example a group of 27 Norwegian Senior Education Leaders visited Norfolk.

The Education Admissions Service returns a high rate of first preferences for Reception pupils. The national offer day for Reception places in April 2016 saw Norfolk maintaining a very high rate with 9600 offers confirmed and 92% given their first preferences. This is similar to 2015 and above the 2015 national and Eastern region averages.

# The power of partnership



**Norfolk schools** have made very good progress in the last three years and on many indicators are now at the national average and beyond. Particularly significant is that 85% of Norfolk's schools are now good or outstanding which means that many more thousands of Norfolk children now go to a good or outstanding school. This has been achieved because of a collective focus and ambition to raise standards from school leaders, teachers, governors and the LA, and the power of a range of partnerships and school improvement programmes.

Over the last academic year Norfolk Better to Best (NB2B) has continued to work with 238 schools. The success of the approach in supporting Ofsted inspection outcomes has continued with 88% of schools inspected being judged good or outstanding.

NB2B is designed to provide school and academy leaders and governors with a framework and menu of challenge and support focused on improving leadership, provision and outcomes. The aim is to

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# Brave Leadership

Litcham School was rightly judged as "Requires Improvement" in 2013. Key to rapid improvement was strengthening the quality of governance and leadership. The LA had already brokered significant support including working with Local Leaders of



Education. A new Governing Body had been constituted who recruited individuals with an excellent range of skills and expertise, and Jim Adams had been appointed as Headteacher. Staff worked incredibly hard to implement these changes well, with a relentless focus on improving the quality of teaching and learning. Additional support was sought through the Local Authority with programmes including NB2B being particularly effective. This was done sensitively and in partnership with the school. Jim left the school for another headship after two years of effective leadership which really moved the school on. In September 2015, Governors appointed a highly experienced Headteacher and an experienced Head of Primary phase to identify and manage further areas for improvement. The school was re-inspected in November 2015 and was judged to be "Good" overall with care and support for pupils being outstanding. Ofsted stated that "the new Headteacher has had a significant impact on raising the expectations of both teachers and pupils. Litcham is confident that it can rapidly become outstanding. Leadership, governance and teaching are now very strong and the school is outward looking. It is a fantastic and happy place to work and study. Litcham is forging strong partnerships to secure further improvement with local schools, Teaching Schools and the UEA for example. None of this would

have been possible without brave leadership.

# From Ofsted inadequate to good

In February this year Old Buckenham Primary School were proud to receive a Good Ofsted judgement following it's inadequate judgement in 2015. The school was assessed by NCC and an Intervention Officer then became involved with the school.

The journey to get to good was filled with the determined attitude of all school staff and a willingness to dig deep' when faced with a serious challenge. The school also benefited from effective support from Cluster Head teachers, the Teaching School and the Local Authority. The newly established Senior Leadership team received invaluable support and challenge from the Intervention Officers and strength from their desire to see the school succeed.



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# Journey to Outstanding

The Lionwood Infant School journey began in 2007 and I knew that in order for us to achieve 'good' we must aim for 'outstanding'. Our inspection in 2011 saw much of what we were doing as outstanding but teaching and Learning was not outstanding everywhere.

By 2016 our inspection turned from one day to two. Convincing one inspector that we were outstanding was the challenge. We worked hard to encourage Ofsted to see beyond the data and to be willing to see more than is usual.

On day two, I was not really needed. (Though I wouldn't have missed it for the world) The day was led by the staff, at all levels across the school, It didn't matter who went where or what they saw, they did not need timetables or guides. They needed to absorb the strengths of the school, look, listen and live it.
